Board Meeting Minutes for August 8, 2023

Present: Board Members: Kathy Anderson, Carlton Brooks, Lindsay Combs, Fred Falker, Tracee

Holmes, Mike Quinlan, Ross Woolsey, Ken Rinderknecht.

School Staff: Dr. Douglas Thaman, James Beverly, William Randall, Ginger Luckett.

4:50 PM - Board Meeting was officially called to order by Kathy Anderson at the Elementary School following a reception for Board members to be able to meet and welcome new North Side faculty members.

Approval of Minutes: The minutes of the June 13, 2023 Board Meeting were reviewed and approved by unanimous vote of the Board, with no corrections.

Public Comment Period: No one was present to offer public comment.

Executive Director/Administration Report: Dr. Thaman reviewed elements of his written August 2023 Executive Director's Report. Faculty/Staff hiring for the 2022-23 school year has been successful in adding talented teachers, with only 2 teaching positions remaining to be filled. Dr Thaman also provided a review of elements of new Curricula Resources to be utilized during the upcoming year, including: Amplify CKLA and Amplify ELA, Illustrative Mathematics, Amplify Science, and Impact Social Studies. Teachers received a summer stipend for the purpose of developing effective lesson plans. Beginning this Thursday, teachers will receive 10 days of extensive training re: the new Curricula Resources.

Dr Thaman reviewed the scheduled Professional Development orientation and team building activities to be held leading up to the beginning of school in 2 weeks. He advised that the "Back-To-School Bash" will be held on Saturday, August 19 from 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM. The event will bring together students, families and the community. It will feature teacher stations, play areas, booths, student enrollment, food stations and various other activities. All are invited to attend, and to volunteer if possible.

Dr Thaman also discussed elements of the newly formed Caring Adults Alliance, to be launched on August 19. The Alliance is designed to promote, encourage and document parent and family engagement in North Side activities and events. The Alliance will have an organized structure, with committee members and a process for electing officers. Monthly meetings will be held to plan initiatives.2023 is North Side's year for development and submission of a Continuous School



Improvement Plan (CSIP) to the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Board approval of the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Special Education Local Compliance Plan is also required. *The Special Education Local Compliance Plan was approved by unanimous vote of the Board.

479 children are currently registered to attend North Side, including 414 returning students. Dr Thaman also reported faculty will be making home and/or coordinated visits at alternate locations prior to the beginning of school. Further, Westbrook & Co. will be at North Side on August 15 and 16 as part of the annual audit.

Finance Committee Report: Carlton Brooks and Will Randall reviewed elements of the June 2023 Financials, noting end of fiscal year assets of \$2,563,648, a loan balance of \$811,848, and a surplus of \$297,537 at the end of the fiscal year. The July 2023 Financials show a current year to date surplus of \$144,198 as of end of July.

Will noted the 2023-24 budget projections are based on an estimated per diem rate of \$11,697 per student, while the per diem rate received in July 2023 was over \$12,000 per student.

The check registers for June, 2023 and for July, 2023, and for checks written for over \$10,000 for each month, were reviewed. *The June check register was approved by unanimous Board vote. *The July check register was also approved by unanimous Board vote.

Development Committee Report: James Beverly reviewed elements of the August 2023 Development Report, including a projected 2023-24 funding summary and extensive lists of grants received, grant requests submitted and pending, and grants not awarded. James also discussed other Development plans, events and activities, including the October 24 Top Golf event, expanding donor relations, and the need to select a 2024 Gala venue. Planning for the Back-To-School Bash is ongoing, as are marketing and communications efforts - including Spirit Week and an Anti-Bullying campaign.

Board members are encouraged to provide updated bios and to have their pictures taken on Picture Day at the Elementary campus - set for Wednesday, September 6.

Governance Committee Report: Byron Francis has advised that there has been no positive response from any of the potential new Board nominees to date. The committee will meet again soon to develop plans to pursue other prospects who have already been identified.

Facilities Committee Report: Ross Woolsey discussed various facilities maintenance issues, including the need for sidewalk repair/improvement on the Elementary campus. Also the fields there



would need an irrigation system. Installing turf might be cheaper in the long run but would require an expensive initial outlay. The goal is to develop a 5 to 10 year plan/priority list re: maintenance of floors, roofs, all facilities.

Strategic Plan Committee Report: Mike Quinlan reported the committee will be meeting with 4 applicants/candidates to determine who will serve as consultant for development of the Strategic Plan. The goal is to finalize the Strategic Plan by mid-January of 2024. The process is to be open, with the hope that all Board members will weigh in with their input.

New Business: Kathy reminded all that the next Board meeting will be held on September 19 at 4:30 PM at the Middle School. Moving forward the plan is that Board meetings will be held on the 3rd Tuesday of the month instead of the 2nd Tuesday. Further, the plan is to continue to hold all Board meetings a the Middle School.

Executive Director's Report September 2023

Items of Significance

1. 2023-2024 Academic Year Kickoff

The 2023-2024 academic year has commenced on a high note. Our dedicated team of educators and staff diligently prepared to ensure an exceptional learning environment for our students.

The year kicked off with our annual Back to School Bash. It was heartening to witness the strong support of our community, with over 400 attendees. This event provided a valuable opportunity for families to connect with our outstanding teaching team, fostering relationships that will undoubtedly contribute to our students' growth and success.

The new school year began with an exciting Anti-Bullying Week. This initiative underscores our commitment to cultivating a culture of kindness, empathy, and respect within our school community. Together, we engaged with the students in a series of activities, informative sessions, and open discussions to raise awareness about the negative impacts of bullying.

In addition to these important community-building efforts, we also focused on enhancing our educational resources successfully beginning the implementation of new curricular materials, providing our students with up-to-date, standards aligned, and engaging resources for their academic journey. Furthermore, we introduced a new student information system (PowerSchool).

- September 19: MS Open House/Curriculum Night A chance for parents to explore our Middle School and learn more about the curriculum.



It's been a very busy start to the year, and I want to acknowledge the tremendous effort put forth by our North Side Community School Team. They have been working tirelessly, and their dedication is truly commendable.

3. Caring Adults Alliance

The North Side Community School Caring Adults Alliance is a newly formed parent and family organization dedicated to fostering a strong partnership between home and school, capturing parent involvement, and promoting effective engagement for the holistic development of students. Recognizing the crucial role parents, grandparents, and guardians play in a child's education, the Alliance aims to enhance parent involvement by encouraging active participation in school activities and events. By doing so, caring adults demonstrate their commitment to their child's education, which positively impacts academic achievement and fosters a positive attitude towards learning.

One of the primary objectives of the Alliance is to capture and document parent involvement systematically. By establishing a comprehensive system, the Alliance can track and record parent participation in various school initiatives and events. This data will be used to create a centralized database, providing valuable insights for analysis, recognition, and improvement of parent engagement strategies.

The Caring Adults Alliance also seeks to encourage effective engagement by providing resources, training, and support for parents, grandparents, and guardians. Workshops and information dissemination sessions will equip caring adults with the necessary skills to support their child's education actively. Additionally, fostering open communication channels between parents, teachers, and school administrators will facilitate collaborative decision-making and problem-solving.

Recognizing the significance of community support, the Alliance plans to collaborate with local organizations, businesses, and community leaders to secure resources, funding, and advocacy efforts that directly benefit the students and enhance the educational experience. Through collective action, the Alliance aims to create a network of support that extends beyond the school walls.

The vision of the Caring Adults Alliance is to empower parents, grandparents, and guardians to shape a brighter future for their children, while its mission centers on fostering a strong partnership between home and school, capturing parent involvement, and promoting effective engagement for the holistic development of students.

To achieve its goals and objectives, the Alliance will have an organized structure, including an Executive Committee comprising President, Vice President, and Secretary. The committee members will have designated roles and responsibilities, and there will be a defined process for their election or selection. Subcommittees such as Events and Activities, Communication and Outreach, and Parent Education and Training will work towards specific areas of focus.



To date 75 parents/guardians have signed up to take part in the Caring Adult Alliance. A survey is being distributed to further define logistics.

Monthly meetings will be held to discuss progress, plan upcoming initiatives, and provide opportunities for parents to participate virtually or remotely to accommodate diverse schedules.

The Alliance has an array of activities and initiatives planned to create a vibrant and engaged school community. These include organizing family-friendly events, offering parent education workshops, establishing effective communication platforms, developing volunteer programs, and recognizing the contributions of caring adults through a volunteer appreciation program.

Through the efforts of the Caring Adults Alliance, North Side Community School aims to create an inclusive and supportive educational environment where students can thrive academically, socially, and emotionally, with caring adults playing a vital role in their success.

Compliance Update

1. Title 1.A Annual Fall Meeting

On September 14, 2023, North Side Community School hosted its Title I.A Annual Fall Meeting as part of the Open House and Curriculum Night agenda. The meeting began with a warm welcome, emphasizing the significance of parental involvement within our school community.

During the meeting, North Side Community School's (NSCS) participation in Title I.A was discussed comprehensively. The school's allocation from the state, granted by the federal government, was presented, with an emphasis on its basis in census poverty and the population of children aged 5 to 17, encompassing those in neglected/delinquent institutions and foster care. This allocation plays a pivotal role in enabling NSCS to maintain small class sizes, typically consisting of 15 to 18 students per class.

The meeting also delved into the various Title I.A requirements. Federal requirements regarding parental involvement, including the necessity of holding at least two meetings per year (Fall and Spring) to actively engage parents, were explained. NSCS's commitment to seeking parent input and disseminating vital information through channels such as the School Parent and Family Engagement Policy, School Parent Compact, and the Schoolwide Program Plan was underscored.



In addition to federal requirements, the meeting highlighted NSCS's compliance with State of Missouri requirements, particularly in disseminating Every Student Succeeds Act Complaint Procedures to all families through the Parent Handbook and actively participating in the monitoring process to ensure adherence to state regulations. Local requirements specific to NSCS were also discussed, reinforcing the school's commitment to surpassing these expectations.

The importance of parents' right to be involved in their children's education was a central theme throughout the meeting. NSCS demonstrated a strong belief in the significance of parental and family involvement by offering multiple avenues for parents to engage with the school community. These avenues encompassed the School Parent and Family Engagement Policy, School Parent Compact, Parent's Right to Know, Notification of Not Appropriately Certified Teaching Staff (with letters in the Fall if needed), and various annual events such as Open House and Literacy Night. The meeting also emphasized the Caring Adults Alliance as a valuable resource for parents seeking active involvement in their children's education.

The meeting's culmination featured an open forum for questions and comments from parents and guardians, fostering a collaborative atmosphere between the school and our dedicated parent community. This gathering reflected NSCS's commitment to transparency, parental engagement, and the shared goal of ensuring the success of every student.

2. North Side Community School's Annual Review Summary (2022-2023)
